## Victory Housing Division

### Emergency & Transitional Housing

Program	Neighborhood	Population Served	Length of Stay
<b>Chamblet Family Home</b>	Dorchester	Families who are homeless and pregnant or living with children.	Nine months
<b>Codman Hill</b>	Dorchester	Young adults ages 18 to 24 who are homeless or have been chronically homeless seeking support in an LGBTQ+ affirming space.	Six to nine months
<b>Portis Family Home</b>	Jamaica Plain	Families experiencing homelessness whose parents are in early recovery (coming from Family Residential Treatment).	Two years
<b>ReVision Family Home</b>	Dorchester	Families who are homeless and pregnant or living with children.	Nine months
<b>Ramada</b>	Dorchester	Pregnant migrant individuals and migrant families.	Nine months
<b>Visions of Victory</b> <i>formerly known as Envision</i>	Jamaica Plain	Men and women experiencing long-term homelessness accompanied with substance use disorders and mental health concerns.	Unlimited
<b>Willows</b>	South End	Women experiencing chronic homelessness who may also be living with mental health concerns and substance use disorder.	Unlimited

Program	Location	Population Served	Length of Stay
<b>Arborway</b>	Jamaica Plain	Women exiting homelessness with significant histories of substance use, sexual violence, and trauma.	Unlimited
<b>Blue Hill</b>	Dorchester	Individuals with histories of homelessness, substance use disorder, mental health concerns, and chronic health conditions.	
<b>Cedar House</b>	Mattapan	Families whose head-of-household is living with HIV/AIDS.	
<b>Jones</b>	Dorchester	Individuals with histories of homelessness, substance use disorder, mental health concerns, and chronic health conditions.	
<b>Marcella</b>	Roxbury	Individuals with histories of homelessness, substance use disorder, mental health concerns, and chronic health conditions.	
<b>Ruah</b>	Cambridge	Women living with HIV/AIDS.	
<b>Warren</b>	Roxbury	Individuals with histories of homelessness, substance use disorder, mental health concerns, and chronic health conditions.	
<b>Victory Housing at Walnut St.</b>	Roxbury	Formerly homeless individuals with substance use disorders who may also be living with mental health concerns and chronic illnesses.	
<b>Woodrow</b>	Dorchester	Individuals with histories of homelessness, substance use disorder, mental health concerns, and chronic health conditions.

### Case Management, Housing Stabilization, and Wrap-Around Services

Program	Location	Population Served
<b>Bobbie White Housing Services</b>	N/A	Individuals living with HIV/ AIDS.
<b>Keys to Home</b>	Back Bay	Individuals living with HIV or in a household with an HIV+ household member who are low-income.
<b>Paths to Victory</b>	Back Bay	Individuals and families experiencing homelessness, assessed through Coordinated Entry and matched via CAS system.
<b>Rental Assistance Program</b>	Brookline	Individuals living with HIV or in a household with an HIV+ household member, as well as HIV- individuals who inject drugs or are in recovery from injection drug use. Individuals must live in or be moving to Massachusetts and have a gross household income under 80% of the Area Median Income for their household size and location.
<b>Stepping Stones</b>	Back Bay	Individuals exiting recovery homes seeking housing.

Program	Location	Population Served	Length of Stay
<b>The Jamaica Plain Recovery Center (JPRC)</b>	Jamaica Plain	Individuals from all backgrounds who are navigating addiction recovery.	N/A
<b>Living and Recovery Community (LARC)</b>	Jamaica Plain	People living with chronic health conditions diagnosed with substance use disorders. Many of the men and women served also experience mental health concerns and housing insecurity.	90 days; Extensions up to one year
<b>New Joelyn's Home</b>	Dorchester	Cisgender women and members of the LGBTQ+ community diagnosed with substance use disorders, many of whom also experience chronic health conditions (e.g., HIV/AIDS), mental health concerns, and housing insecurity.	90 days; Extensions up to one year
<b>New Victories</b>	Dorchester	Men diagnosed with substance use disorders who may also be dealing with HIV/AIDS, mental health concerns, and housing insecurity.	90 days; Extensions up to one year
<b>Shepherd House</b>	Dorchester	Women diagnosed with substance use disorders, including perinatal mothers with infants (priority placement status), many of whom also experience chronic health conditions, mental health concerns, and housing insecurity.	90 days; Extensions up to one year
<b>Victory House</b>	South End	Men with substance use disorders who may also be dealing with mental health concerns, chronic illnesses, and housing insecurity.	90 days; Extensions up to one year
<b>Women's Hope</b>	Jamaica Plain	Women with co-occurring substance use disorders with severe and persistent mental illness, who may also be dealing with chronic illnesses and housing insecurity.	90 days; Extensions up to one year or more

## Victory Prevention Division

Program	Location	Population Served
<b>Boston Living Center (BLC)</b>	29 Stanhope St., Boston, MA 02116	Individuals living with chronic health conditions, including and beyond HIV, and people who are experiencing housing and/or food insecurity.
<b>Mobile Prevention Team (MPT)</b>	Street and Organization Partnership Outreach throughout Boston	Individuals located throughout Boston who are at high risk for opioid overdose and/or contracting HIV, Hepatitis C, and other sexually transmitted infections.
<b>Victory Connector</b>	965 Massachusetts Ave., Boston, MA 02118	Cisgender and transgender women and nonbinary individuals experiencing homelessness who may be at risk for health complications associated with substance use.
